*The Edmonton Huskies Football Club was formed in 1947 as the Edmonton Athletic Association and commenced play in the four-team Alberta Junior Football League. In 1952, the Edmonton Oilers and the Edmonton Wildcats were the two sponsors of the Edmonton Football Association, until the Oilers became the Edmonton Huskies in 1954. Today, the Huskies play in the six-team Prairie Football Conference and the Canadian Junior Football League which is represented by 20 teams who compete annually for the national title known as the Canadian Bowl.*
